A Community Workshop to Accelerate Local Planning

Primary & Community Care (PACC) Mapping is an engagement and planning approach that helps communities explore how they could address local primary care needs and service gaps. Employing a person-centred approach, those who are actively involved in planning primary care transformation work together to co-create tailored, local solutions in a facilitated workshop.

How it Works

There are three stages to PACC Mapping: *Preparation, Mapping Session, and Feedback*. For most participants, this means attending a 2-hour virtual mapping workshop that brings together community-level stakeholders focused on specific primary care service gaps.

First, a trained facilitator will work with a core group of community stakeholders in the preparation stage to design the mapping workshop – tailoring the session to fit the local context and population of focus. Then, participants are guided through an interactive mapping session featuring persona (simulated cases) that represent the local needs and services gaps. Participants work together in person-centered manner using their local knowledge and expertise to discuss change ideas and co-design solutions. Ideas are prototyped by the group on a virtual map in real-time.



These ideas are synthesized and shared back in a brief, action-oriented summary.

PACC Mapping May Help:

- Increase engagement and collaboration across local groups
- Reduce barriers to care for specific populations in your community
- Accelerate local planning in a person-centred manner
- Provide a roadmap for community action
